Tsunami




- Every placement will have unique risks
- You'll receive localized disaster information in Japan
- Ask your supervisor or Contracting Organization (CO) about
 - Local evacuation routes
 - Emergency shelter locations
 - Safety drills and local alerts



General Preparedness Tips

- Prepare an <u>emergency bag</u> with water, snacks, flashlight, batteries, power bank, cash, medication, etc.
- Stockpile extra food and water in your home
- Know where your closest evacuation shelter is





Following the Rules

- Japan is a low-crime, highly law-abiding society
- Foreigners are held to the same (or higher) standards





- Always Carry your
 Residence Card (Zairyuu
 Card) <u>it's the law!</u>
 - Police may stop you and ask to see it
 - You will get yours at the airport in Japan


What is the maximum blood alcohol content (BAC) permitted in Japan while biking?



0.03%


Bikes are considered vehicles!

What is the penalty for drinking and driving?



Up to 5 years in prison, up to 1,000,000 yen fine

Interacting with Police

- Police officers are trusted members of the community
- Lost something? Visit the *Kouban (交番*, police box)
- If you are stopped, be polite and cooperative. As a foreigner, you may not always be given the benefit of the doubt.
- If you feel uncomfortable or unsafe, request to speak to a superior officer or call your supervisor.





More Biking Rules

- Make sure your bike is registered with the police
- Use bike lights at night
- No phone use, umbrella holding, or earphones!
- Wear a helmet!

TRAVEL SMART – TRAVEL SAFE

Drugs that are prohibited in Japan may surprise you!

Any form of marijuana, including CBD oil that may contain THC, even for medical use is





Any medication that contains amphetamines is

ILLEGAL



Many over-the-counter and prescription medications common in the United States, including ones for pain, depression, ADHD, and many kinds of decongestants and allergy medications are

ILLEGAL



YOU RISK ARREST

in Japan for bringing in banned substances, even with a valid U.S. prescription!



CHECK BEFORE YOU GO, IT'S YOUR RESPONSIBILITY!




- •Not all faux pas are illegal, but some may draw social disapproval, get you reported, or reflect poorly on your employer
- •Such as...
 - Being loud or disruptive on transit and other public places
 - Refusing to follow garbage-sorting rules
 - Jaywalking (this is technically illegal)





You are a representative of your country—your actions will influence people's perception of the U.S. and other JETs.









- •Disaster information for earthquakes, typhoons, floods, tsunamis, heavy rain, etc.












- •Free email updates and alerts from U.S. Embassy
- •Real time updates on health, weather, safety, and security
- •Helps the embassy/consulate contact you if there's an emergency like a natural disaster, civil unrest, or a family emergency
